#### **NSS results**

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- 2021 sector results are the lowest in NSS history.
- LSBU is ranked 108<sup>th</sup> out of 119 providers for both Average score and Overall Satisfaction, but has not seen the largest declines in the sector for these measures.
- Two Schools performed above subject sector benchmark.
- Impact of cyber-attack many other institutions reported as having suffered cyber-attacks saw an above sector average decline in Average score and Overall Satisfaction.

#### NSS results – Impact of Covid-19

LSBU scored at or above sector average in the specific questions on Covid-19. For example, Covid-related physical safety measures had a 79% Agree score.

With the exception of Learning Resources, where we were 32 percentage points below the sector average.

#### **Graduate Outcomes Definitions**


There is no universal, sector-wide definition of Graduate Outcomes. The OfS uses different definitions for different purposes.

The OfS Proceed definition is less stringent than the OfS Condition of Registration B3 definition:

Note that 20/21 Graduate Outcomes results (in either definition) are strictly **embargoed** until the HESA data release on 27<sup>th</sup> July 2021

#### **Graduate Outcomes: B3 Definition**




19/20 and 20/21 figur are based on internal calculations for UK domiciled, FT, first degree students

In the 20/21 results, 1 subjects are above, 9 subjects within OfS threshold of concern (35-50%) and 1 subject is below Of threshold of significa concern (<35%)

The OfS has stated the B3 thresholds will be revised upwards

#### **Graduate Outcomes: Proceed Definition**



19/20 results are as published by the OfS 12 subjects; 13 suppressed subject are shown based on internal calculations b without benchmarks; 20/21 estimates are b on internal calculation

5 subjects above and below LSBU benchm in 19/20

6 subjects above an below sector averag 19/20

7 subjects have impro the score year-on-yea and 14 have declined


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## **OfS Proceed Metric**

- Experimental metric published by the OfS on 19 May 2021 intended to provide prospective students with an understanding of student outcomes across the whole student lifecycle.
- Data was published by provider overall and by provider / subject.
- Exist scope: UK domiciled, full-time, first degree students.
- The metric multiplies the HESA completion projection indicator ("Projected to obtain a degree %") with Positive Graduate Outcomes results ("Progression rate %") to give a compound Proceed score.
- LSBU result:
- 72% Projected to obtain a degree x 73.5% Progression rate = 52.9% Proceed score
- The result is -5.4% below the LSBU specific benchmark.
- OfS stated this metric is not intended for regulatory purposes.

## Issues and risks



### League table issues

- What will impact be? Example: Guardian model with the NSS results. This shows a predicted rank of 108<sup>th</sup>, down from 93<sup>rd</sup> last year.
- When will impact happen?
- CUG published 8th June, rank 108 / 131 with 2020 NSS results Guardian 11<sup>th</sup> September, projected rank 108 / 121 Times/Sunday Times late September

## **Regulatory & reputational issues**

- OfS B3 sets minimum baselines for Student Outcomes, above the current ('too lenient') thresholds. These will be absolute levels that are not benchmarked by provider.
- TEF assesses excellence above the B3 baselines and will be benchmarked by provider.
- When will impact happen?
- OFS: B3 metrics consultation opens Autumn 2021 [implementation timeline not yet known]
- TEF: consultation opens Autumn 2021, submissions in Summer 2022, outcomes in early 2023, 4 year cycle (i.e. long lag to improve the rating)

PROGRESSION: Portfolio review, other progression initiatives, including fundraising and philanthropy, curriculum framework


EMPLOYABILITY: Curriculum framework; End-to-end Student Support model, including employability; Graduate Outcomes improvement project; Buginess relationships
