## 1. Welcome and apologies

The above apologies were noted.

## 2. **Declarations of interest**

No member declared an interest in any item on the agenda.

## 3. Minutes of previous meeting

The Board agreed the minutes of the last meeting held on 31 October 2018 as a true and accurate record subject to following amendment being made to

minute 7 to reflect concerns about the ASU Bahrain partnership, health and safety and quality standards.

Minute 7 to include: Several of the Deans raised concerns that the courses were being developed without adequate consultations and without feeling sufficiently reassured that the quality processes were being followed. The Chair confirmed that the issues are being addressed.

## 4. Matters arising

- Degree Algorithm. A working group will be formed for consultations of proposed changes. The Board noted the delay in releasing a confirmed change in the algorithm and the current highly publicised grade inflation debates. However, the issues surrounding grade inflations will not deter the plans LSBU is trying to put in place. The Board noted that the degree calculator is now on the MyLSBU website and will soon be placed on Moodle and other sites. The Chair is to follow up on how to communicate the changes more widely.
- Exam invigilation. The Board were informed that no fire alarms had been set off by students during the exam period. There were no disciplinary or behavioural issues to report.

## 5. **Provost's report**

The Provost provided an update on the following:

- Admissions 2018 2019. The admissions are set to reach the intended targets. The Board noted that the apprenticeships admissions were on target. Health and Social Care courses recruit in cycles so this can influence the final admission figures.
- Finances. The Board noted that the key drivers for finance are set to reach targets.
- Recruitment September 2019. The Board noted that recruitment for the year has been good. Overall, applications have been down by 5% compared to the figures of this time last year when taking into account the Health and Social Care (HSC) applicants. However, if the HSC applicants were excluded then recruitment figures will be up by 5%. HSC numbers are constrained by placement offers and are set to reach their intended targets by the end of the academic year. The Board noted that the overall application numbers in the sector are down by 7% and the results indicate that the current market is tough.

Firm acceptance applicants have increased significantly since last year. The publicity surrounding the offering of unconditional offers was noted. The Board noted the concerns surrounding the offer holder days. Two divisions had to be cancelled due to low student numbers. The Chair will follow up the concerns and provide a resolution outside the meeting.

- Estates changes. The Schools of Arts and Creative Industries (ACI), Health and Social Care (HSC) and Law and Social Sciences (LSS) are currently undergoing changes. The Board noted changes around the campus and the refurbishment of London Road. The Board noted concerns relating to delays of the refurbishment works and whether it may lead to problems of not having things in place by the new academic year. The Board noted that informal discussions are being held with students.
- Lambeth College. The Board noted that the College became part of the LSBU Group on 1 February 2019. The Chair thanked those that attended the Launch day. The feedback from Colleagues at LSBU and Lambeth were positive. Overall, the occasion was a success.
- Ofsted. An Ofsted inspection is currently being undertaken at the University for apprenticeships/level 4 and 5 courses.

## 6. **Student Union Issues (as required)**

The Board noted that the National Student Survey (NSS) video has been launched. The Chair thanked the SU President for the excellent work done on the NSS video.

## 7. Academic Board membership proposal

The Chair provided a background to the proposed changes to the Academic Board membership. The proposed changes will ensure that the Academic Board membership will be more representative of staff at all levels.

The Board raised concerns of a lack of postgraduate representatives on the Academic Board. The Board noted the issue regarding an increase in size and the effectiveness of the Board. The Board agreed that representatives from the schools should represent the breadth of what goes on in their School.

The Chair informed the Board that gender and ethnicity will be considered with the proposed changes. However, this balance may be difficult to impose as members will be assigned via voting. It was further suggested that membership training should be provided to members upon appointment. This will enable new members to fully understand their role and what it entails.

It was suggested that no representative from the personal services groups (PSGs) should be required and the focus should be on the academics and students. The Student Experience Committee may be better suited to members of the PSGs. The SU President suggested that the postgraduate officer, who is an elected member may be a potential candidate for the postgraduate membership position. The Board noted the commitment challenges this may face as the postgraduate officer is usually a part-time student.

The Board noted the nomination/selection process that will involve either candidates nominating themselves or being nominated by their colleagues. A

secret ballot/vote will take place in the various schools/departments.

The Board recommended the following membership proposals/changes:

- The senior academic members to be made up of three staff members from each School (a Dean/DESE and two other senior staff members)
- The non- teaching staff to include the Director of Academic Quality Development, one nominated research staff member, one nominated technical staff member and three student representatives (SU President, SU VP Education and a postgraduate representative).

The Board noted that any changes will need to be approved by the Board of Governors.

## 8. **ASU Bahrain interim update**

The Board received an update on Applied Science University (ASU) Bahrain and noted that a report was presented at the Quality and Standards Committee meeting of 23 January 2019. The issues presented by the Academic Board and Quality and Standards Committee have been addressed and the report has been signed off.

## 9. Student academic outcomes

This item will be presented at a future meeting.

## 10. Education strategy 2018-2020

The Board reviewed the Education Strategy, which is to run in sequence with the current corporate strategy. The focus is on measures that will generate the most change for the University over a two-year period. The Board noted that the strategy has been through a process of consultation and was approved by the Quality and Standards Committee meeting of 23 January 2019.

The Academic Board approved the Education strategy 2018-2020.

## 11. Framework for monitoring LSBU Apprenticeship Provision (10a)

The Board discussed the Ofsted reporting expectations that involves the Board of Governors being provided with information about the quality of the provision. It was suggested that a representative from the Apprenticeship Committee attends the Academic Board for information and reporting back purposes.

The Framework was approved subject to clarity being provided on the membership of the Apprenticeship Committee and how it reports or aligns with other committees. The information will be circulated to the members.

## 12. Emeritus Professorships

The Board noted the Emeritus Professorships.

## 13. **Reports from sub-committees**

The Board noted the reports from the sub-committees.

## 14. Academic KPIs

The Board noted the Academic KPIs.

The Board was notified that clarity surrounding the research funding allocations were required. The Chair agreed to address the budgeting allocations and discuss with the Deans.

### **Executive Summary**

The Academic Regulations have been reviewed and amended for clarity in light of issues arising during the 18/19 academic year. The regulations have been amended for clarification and to include references to the university's procedures and any guidance relating to specific types of provision such as apprenticeships and transnational education. Following Academic Board, the relevant procedures will be updated and relevant links to guidance and procedures will be inserted at appropriate points in the regulations.

The Academic Calendar 20/21 is presented for approval. There are no significant differences from the version for 19/20 version but dates have been amended as appropriate.



Academic Regulations

2019/20

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#### Academic Regulations 2019/20

- 1.0 These regulations are approved by the Academic Board of London South Bank University. They were last updated in June 2018.
- 1.1 The academic regulations guarantee the standards of all our awards, including research degrees. The Academic Regulations (including any changes made to the regulations) are the responsibility of our Academic Board. They apply to all academic awards that we have the right to make under powers granted through the Further and Higher Education Act. Please refer for details to the university's <u>Qualification</u> Framework. The awarding powers allow us to:
  - a. grant degrees, diplomas, certificates and other academic awards to students who have successfully completed courses which we have set, approved, monitored and reviewed and who have passed our assessment;
  - b. grant honorary degrees and awards to students in line with criteria and conditions which we set;
  - c. grant Edexcel awards under licence from Pearson (the company that owns the awards); and
  - d. withdraw any academic and honorary award we have granted, if there is a good reason for this.
- 1.2 University Procedures and the <u>Research Degrees Code of Practice</u> explain how we will apply the academic Regulations
- 1.3 All staff and students must keep to our academic regulations. Please also refer to the Academic Misconduct Procedure. We treat all students fairly and equally, and take strict measures to avoid bias in our processes. We make reasonable adjustments to our processes when necessary to make sure that a student is not disadvantaged because of their disability, pregnancy, maternity (whether they are pregnant or have recently given birth), or other characteristics protected by law.
- 1.4 We are allowed to use our discretion when applying the academic regulations in exceptional circumstances, as long as any variation is reasonable, is agreed by - is agreed by the Provost or Chief Operating Officer and Deputy Vice - Chancellor (Education) and a record of the decision held by Govlegal.
- 1.5 There will be cases where we may have to alter the way we apply procedures for other regulatory reasons, for example to meet the requirements of different professional bodies. Some university provision will be subject to additional specific requirements. For instance apprenticeships and Transnational Education. Your course specification will also contain relevant details.
- 1.6 We have a responsibility to the Home Office to check that all students enrolled and studying in the UK have the right to do so. Before you enrol and while you are studying with us, we have the right to ask to see documents which show your right to remain in the UK. We can take action to suspend or exclude you if you fail to show us documents which can prove this. In all cases, the Home Office's rules take priority over our regulations. Please see further details about our Procedures relating to immigration regulations on our website.

#### 2.0 List of awards

2.1 The different types of awards we make are approved by the Academic Board. All our awards have the appropriate approval and monitoring arrangements. For details of awards offered and the progression criteria for each, see List of Awards. Any award can be made as an 'aegrotat' (a certificate stating that you were, and are likely to remain, too ill to take the exam) and can be awarded posthumously (after your death if you die while studying with us or after completing your course). For details on how we assess taught awards, please see the <u>Assessment and Examinations Procedure.</u> For research degrees you should read the academic regulations with the <u>Research Degrees Code of Practice.</u>

#### 3.0 Research degrees

3.1 We may propose programmes of research in any approved field of study. All proposed programmes will lead to scholarly research that will be assessed by examiners. All proposed research programmes will be considered for research degree registration on their academic

We encourage co-operation with industrial, commercial, professional or research establishments for the purposes of research leading to research degree awards. These organisations are known as 'collaborating establishments' and will be recorded on your thesis and certificate.

- 3.2 Each research degree should demonstrate research ability and, where this applies, original contribution to knowledge (specific details are in the <u>Research Degrees Code of Practice)</u>.
- 4.0 University admissions and enrolment
- 4.1 We use admissions criteria to admit students to courses if we consider them to have a reasonable expectation of completing the award and achieving the required standard. We consider applicants based on their previous attainment (for example, qualifications and experience) and evidence of potential.
- 4.2 Students will normally have reached the age of 18 before admission to the university. For the purposes of this regulation, 'admission' is defined as September 1<sup>St</sup> in the academic year of entry. Applicants who will be under 18 on this date must follow requirements of the <u>Procedures for Applicants under the age of 18 at entry</u>
- 4.3 There is a specific admissions Procedure for apprentices Please see guidance for apprenticeships. Please note that no applicant to an apprenticeship can be enrolled and admitted to study until all contractual elements have been completed. There is no circumstance in which an applicant to a university apprenticeship can be admitted to course activities before completing enrolment. You must have a suitable standard of English. Please see the <u>Admissions and Enrolment Procedure</u> for more details.
- 4.4 You must keep to the conditions set out in the Admissions and Enrolment Procedure.
- 4.5 If you are in the School of Health and Social Care, your studies involve contact with patients or service users and you are enrolled on any course that involves registration to practise as a professional, you must keep to the <u>Fitness to Practise Procedure</u>.
- 4.6 If you have an appeal or complaint about admissions, you should contact the Head of Admissions.
   Please see the Applicant Complaints and Appeals of Decision Procedure

#### 5.0 Varying a course or transferring to a different course

- 5.1 If you are on a taught course, we may allow you to transfer from one course to another within the university. We will give permission only on the recommendation of the director for the course you want to transfer to and you must keep to the conditions set out in the <u>Changing Courses Procedure</u>.
- 5.2 There is specific guidance for apprentices who may wish to change course..
- 5.3 A student may, subject to timetable and other published restrictions, change a choice of optional module with the written approval of the school responsible for teaching the module and (if different) the school responsible for the student's course.
- 5.4 In exceptional circumstances, we may allow you to vary your course by swapping a module for a module from another course. Permission may be granted by an exam board on the recommendation of the relevant course director. In cases of complicated judgements about course transfers or variations, a panel of senior university staff may be responsible for making the decision.

#### 6.0 University assessment and examinations

- 6.1 The assessment method, criteria for assessment and marking we use are based on learning outcomes and reflect the credit level of the module. We will assess your progress within or at the end of each module (or both). We do not allow the same allocation of credit to be used to meet the requirements of more than one academic award at the same level ('double counting'). You should not receive more than one allocation of credit for achieving a learning outcome unless you are on an approved progression pathway such as an apprenticeship where qualifications build up and contribute to the final award.
- 6.2 Alternative assessment arrangements can be approved by the Quality and Standards Committee for students from other higher-education providers who are taking modules at our university which do not contribute to a qualification we award. There are more details in the <u>Assessment and Examinations</u> <u>Procedure</u>.

#### 7.0 Coursework

- 7.1 All work we assess must be in English, unless specified in the course specification.
- 7.2 There are details of the processes for handing in coursework and handing in coursework late in

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#### 8.0 Examinations

- 8.1 A summary of the rules for examination candidates is displayed in every examination room. These rules apply to all examinations. You must make sure you are familiar with the examination rules. Please see the Assessment and Examinations Procedure.
- 8.2 The Academic Misconduct Procedure is also applicable to all students studying for an LSBU award

#### 9.0 Circumstances outside your control

9.1 If you believe that your assessed work has been negatively affected by circumstances outside your control (extenuating circumstances), you can draw these circumstances to the attention of the award and progression examination board by making a claim for extenuating circumstances. Please see the Extenuating Circumstances Procedure which applies to all university courses.

#### 10.0 Examination boards

- 10.1 Decisions about assessment outcomes for students must be made by an examination board. These decisions must be consistent with the academic regulations, and with any local rules which apply, based on other regulatory requirements, for example from a professional, statutory and regulatory body (PSRB) or apprenticeship set out in the relevant course specification.
- 10.2 External examiners report on university standards and student achievement in relation to those standards. They do not moderate or adjust the marks of individual students.
- 10.3 The University operates a two-tier system of examination boards for the determination of marks, progression and awards at undergraduate and postgraduate level:
  - 1) Module Boards and
  - 2) University Progression and Awards Boards

Module Boards meet prior to the University Progression and Award Board. The confirmed marks and recommendations are then considered by the University Progression and Award Board which makes decisions on the final result for each student on a particular award or group of awards

#### 11.00 Progression and awards

- 11.1 Progression means a student can move to a higher stage of study. If you have passed all the modules in one stage of study you can progress to the next stage
- 11.2 You must have passed all relevant modules (or had any failures condoned or compensated) before you can receive an award. Further information is available in <u>the Assessment and Examinations</u> <u>Procedure</u>
- 11.3 If you have built up the necessary credit within the time allowed, you are eligible for the award you are enrolled for, unless we decide to withhold the award for reasons relating to academic misconduct or because you owe us money.

#### 12.0 Attempts atassessment

- 12.1 Details of assessment processes and arrangements for resits are outlined in the university <u>Assessment and</u> <u>Examinations Procedure</u>
- 12.2 The university defines extenuating circumstances as circumstances outside your control which may have a negative impact on an assessment. You may apply for extenuating circumstances and these will be considered by an independent panel and if agreed will be applied accordingly to your assessment. The university Extenuating Circumstances Procedure explains this process in detail.
- 12.3 If you have not completed the module's assessment requirements to the necessary standard after the resit opportunity, we may allow you to repeat that module. If a module is to be repeated and the university charges a fee, should all assessments be re-taken. This is in line with practice in other HEIs.

12.4 You are not usually allowed to register more than twice on any module. Please see the <u>Assessment</u> <u>and Examinations Procedure.</u>

#### 13.0 Marks and results

13.1 Your marks and results are confidential and we will release them only to you (or, if you are an apprenticeship student to you and your employer). However, the fact that we have made an award, and its classification, are not confidential. For full details about marks and results please see the <u>Assessment and Examinations procedure.</u>

#### 14.0 Copyright

14.1 If you take notes during lectures you must use these only for the purpose of private study. If recording l lectures will assist you in your studies, please ask for the consent of the relevant lecturer so that any specific conditions can be agreed. Any such recordings must be used for private study only.

#### 15.0 Interrupting, suspending or ending your registration

- 15.1 You can apply for an interruption from your studies at any time. If you want to apply to interrupt your studies, please see the Interruption and Withdrawal Procedure and where relevant, the Student pregnancy, maternity, paternity and adoption Procedure.
- 15.2 If you are a student on an apprenticeship, your employer must also agree to the interruption of studies There are additional requirements for apprentices who wish to interrupt their studies and your employment status may be affected. Please refer to the apprenticeship guidance
- 15.3 The University Progression and Award Board records our decision to agree to an interruption of studies. 15.4 In exceptional circumstances, we may decide it is appropriate to interrupt your studies. In these cases the
- appropriate Director of Education and Student Experience will make the decision (in consultation with your employer if you are an apprentice) and you will have the right to appeal against the decision through the Chief Operating officer and Deputy Vice Chancellor (Education. The maximum period of interruption to your studies in these circumstances would be until the beginning of the next academic year or the next registration point, whichever is sooner.
- 15.5 If you are a research student and ill-health or other circumstances outside your control prevent you from making progress with your research, you can apply to interrupt your studies, normally for six months. In exceptional cases, we may allow you to interrupt your studies for a period of one year. You must normally provide written evidence to support your application for a period of interruption. If you want to interrupt your research, please see the <u>Research Code of Practice</u>.

15.6 In some circumstances, we may have to exclude or suspend students. This may apply if you:

- fail to keep to the terms of a visa see <u>ImmigrationRegulations;</u>
  - have committed a disciplinary offence see the <u>Student Disciplinary procedure and Academic Misconduct</u> <u>Procedure</u>
- are unfit to study at the moment, but may be reasonably expected to be fit to study again in the future see the <u>Fitness to StudyProcedure</u>.
- As a student apprentice your employment has been terminated following disciplinary or fitness to practice Procedures.
- 15.7 If we suspend you during a semester, you will not be considered to have made an attempt at any uncompleted assessments for that semester. The University Progression and Award Board will determine any consequences for the student's progression or award resulting from a period of suspension
- 15.8 If you have been suspended, you will normally continue your studies in the following academic year at the beginning of the semester in which the suspension took place.
- 15.9 We may ask to see evidence (for example, a medical certificate) before allowing you to enrol and continue your studies see the <u>Admissions and Enrolment Procedure</u>.
- 15.10 You may decide to withdraw from your course. This means permanently leaving the course before successfully completing it. Once you have withdrawn from a course you will not normally be allowed to enrol onto that course again see the <u>Interruption, and Withdrawal Procedure</u>. The university Award and Progression board may decide to end your studies and withdraw you from your course taking into consideration your academic record and engagement with the course. see the <u>Assessment and Examinations Procedure</u>.
- 15.11 If an examination board has ended your studies, or you have been excluded or suspended, you can appeal to the Chief Operating officer and Deputy Vice-Chancellor (education)

#### 16.0 Complaints and appeals

16.1 A complaint is an expression of dissatisfaction about something we have done or have failed to do, or our standards of service, on or off campus, which you have not been able to deal with through

informal processes. You can make a complaint on your own or with a group of students. Please see the Student Complaints Procedure.

- 16.2 Employers who sponsor students or whose employees are on an apprenticeship at LSBU can make a complaint. Please see the Employer Complaint Procedure.
- 16.3 You can use our Academic Complaints Procedure to appeal against our decisions relating to administering

The marking process, your progression on a course and awarding qualifications. This includes decisions made by examination boards about circumstances outside your control and decisions taken through the academic misconduct process. During the appeals process, 'academic judgement' refers to the judgement of an academic member of staff about their subject of academic expertise. You cannot appeal against academic judgement.

- 16.4 You must be aware of, and follow, our regulations and procedures. You cannot appeal against a decision because you did not understand or were not aware of course or university regulations. This includes regulations relating to extending a date for submitting coursework, making a claim for extenuating circumstances within the deadline, finding out examination results or interrupting your studies.
- 16.5 We provide an independent advice service, usually through the students' union to support you with understanding our policies, regulations and Procedures
- 16.6 We keep to the regulations of the Office of the Independent Adjudicator (OIA). At the end of the internal appeal or complaints process, we will issue a 'Completion of Procedures' letter which gives you a right to appeal to the OIA. The OIA review the way we apply our processes and consider whether our decision has been reasonable in the circumstances.
- 16.7 We will keep details of the appeal and relevant documents on file until after you have completed your course.
- 16.8 The University Secretary is responsible for working with the Office of the Independent Adjudicator and making sure that we follow their recommendations and observations.

## **Executive Summary**

The report provides an overview of the operations of the University Ethics Panel for the academic year 2018/19. The main areas:

- Implementation of HAPLO Ethics Monitor module
- Ethics Code of Practice
- Administrative support for Ethics
- Training
- Chair of the UEP
- 1. HAPLO Ethics Monitor module

The HAPLO Ethics monitor module was implemented in November 2018. The trial period was completed in December 2018 and from January 2019 all ethics applications are submitted and processed through HAPLO. This has enabled the schools and the university panel to monitor applications via HAPLO and share documentation more easily. Feedback from applicants and those processing applications suggest the system is a marked improvement on old processes.

2. Ethics Code of Practice

The Ethics Code of Practice is being updated and finalised. The panel is working with the REI to identify appropriate support to finalise the Code of Practice and crossreference with other policies, such as data protection, research open, etc. This will require admin support to complete in terms of collating information, preparing sections for final publication, and cross referencing with other LSBU materials (such as other regulations)

## 3. Administrative support for Ethics

There is no clear support for the UEP and also in some schools. Although HAPLO has reduced some of the administrative workload, there is pressure on the chair and school coordinators to manage administrative functions of the role. This is particularly apparent during projects (such as training development/code of conduct revision) where lack of admin support hampers timely changes being implemented.

## 4. Training

REI is developing ethics training for doctoral supervisors and students. The chair will be providing ethics support via webinars next academic year, which will be recorded and available as a digital resource. School panels also provide training workshops to meet needs on an ad-hoc basis.

There is still a growing need for ethics panel reviewers to be trained with the help from OD and REI.

## 5. Chair of the UEP

From the academic year 2019/20, the vice chair of the UEP, Prof. Dan Frings, School of Applied Science, will take on the role as the chair of the University Ethics.
