### Extra-curricular activities & employability

#### Key messages:

• More than two-thirds of LSBU students are significantly (+5.8%) more 'positive' or 'very positive' about their employment prospects, compared to the national picture.

Page 6

- More than 1 in 4 LSBU Students are more likely to work 21-40hrs a week compared to a national picture of just 12%, with more than 1 in 2 working between 11-20hrs/wk compared to a national picture of 42%. Both student employees (+6.3%) and volunteers (+2.9%) are more confident this is helping their employability prospects.
- LSBU Students are also three time more likely to volunteer for 12hrs or more a week

### Which three criteria most strongly affected student choice of University?

### LSBU

- **1.** Location (65.9%/+22.1%)
- 2. Course content (60%/+5.1%)
- 3. Entry Criteria (36.8%/+10.3%)

#### **Others**

- 1. Course Content (54.9%/-5.1%)
- **2.** Location (43.8%/-22.1%)
- 3. Teaching Quality (37.2%/+4.8%)

Other significant positive variances in the choices our students make in choosing LSBU, particularly the importance of 'student support services', which is three times the national average and the 'Students' Union' which is almost double the national average.

**'League Table'** position only was a key criteria for 11.4% of students, two thirds lower than the national average at 32.9%, as well as **'Cost of living'** which was 59.5% lower than the national average.

### **Travel Accommodation & Food**

### Accommodation

- Almost **1** in **3** LSBU students (31%) still live at their family home compared to 15.7% of the national sample.
- **10.3% of LSBU students own their own home**, more than 3.5 times the national sample.
- 15.6% of LSBU students report paying £251+ a week on rent, compared to 8.2% nationally.
- Three most **significant housing factors** are: **Cost**, **Distance & Quality**. Transport links, being a part of a local community and access to childcare also more significant than the national sample too



# Travel

- More than 1 in 3 (38.9%) students) of **students are travelling a significantly greater amount of time** (3.5 times the national average to come to LSBU than other universities.
- Almost six times the national average are reporting campus attendance of 1 day a week. 2.5 times the average report contact times of 2 days on campus a week.
  - Only 7.6%, compared to a national average of 35.5%, report being on campus 5 days a week



# Food

- The modal average of expenditure on food at LSBU is  $\pounds 6-7.99$  nationally its  $\pounds 4-5.99$
- LSBU Students are significantly less likely to bring their own
  food to campus (-8.1%) and more likely to purchase food off
  ampus to eat whilst at uni (+11.9%)
  - Almost **1** in **4** students (24%) definitely disagree that the cost of food on campus is reasonable and an additional 30% disagree. Overall more than half (53.8%) of LSBU students compared to 42.6 in the national sample, disagree or definitely disagree the cost of campus catering is reasonable.



## Accommodation, Travel & Food

- This research indicates that our students are living both financially and time poorer lives, and the SU recognise this is in many ways is a factor largely outside of the university's control.
- The Maintenance Loan for those Living at home was £7,097 and for those Living in London away from home £11,002/yr – for more than 1 in 5 (21%) of our students their rent alone wont, or will just barely be covered by the loan, this compares to 14% from the national sample.
  - With a high number of those still living at home the true cost of accommodation to student pockets may be masked.



## Accommodation, Travel & Food

Students possibly in search of more affordable properties or, choosing to remain at the familial home, are **commuting significant distances**.

**Q**: What is the affect on learning, campus community and the 'value added' experience of being at university of this commute. Are there interventions we can make?

**Q:** What's the impact on those who have moved to London and are expecting the more traditional student experience? Could this be driving some of the NSS student demographic scores?





# Wellbeing

The affect of University has both a more positive (+1.2%) and more negative (+4.5%) affect on the self reported wellbeing of our students

Finances, probably linked to the higher cost of living, play a more prominent role in the mental wellbeing of our students.

There is no real significance in the Mental Wellbeing score between the total sample and LSBU
