COVID-19 ADDFNDUM

What can you expect with respect to teaching and learning delivery during the Covid-19 pandemic?

The University will always operate in line with public health guidance and with reference to any specific government guidance to Higher Education Providers.

For the 21/22 Academic Year, we have plans in place for the delivery of courses which assume no restrictions on our operation. While this is our primary assumption, the University also has contingency plans which reflect the potential restrictions which we may be compelled to implement at any point during the academic year. The table, below, provides an indication as to how key aspects of both course delivery and access to wider university facilities might alter, depending on the nature of the restrictions which government asks us to put in place.

During the 20/21 Academic Year, government guidance to universities operated under a 4-tier system, reflecting the severity of the restrictions required. We assume a similar system may operate during 21/22, and therefore the guidance below explains how your experience of teaching and learning, assessment, and access to wider university facilities would be altered in line with these different Tiers. Should government guidance operate under a different system, we will update this guidance accordingly.

All provision will be online. This includes access to our student support services who are able to offer most services remotely. However, if government guidance allows, we will provide study facilities on campus for those who cannot access appropriate facilities in their accommodation

^{*}Tiers 3 and 4 are broadly similar in terms of representing the strictest levels of restriction. The government would be expected to allow very limited opportunities for universities to deliver any on campus activity under Tier 3, with further restrictions under Tier 4.

How will you be informed of the impact of restrictions on your course?

If the university is notified that we are require to implement restrictions, we will inform all students of this through our main communication channels (email, social media, website). Given the varied nature of our courses, Course Directors will be responsible for providing specific information on how the restrictions will affect the delivery of your course, including guidance on your timetabled classes, and which may be continuing on campus, and which may need to be delivered online.

Depending on the severity of the restrictions, and the notice period given to the university for their implementation, it may be necessary to pause delivery of courses for a short time to allow both staff and students to manage the transition. Should this be necessary, this will be explained to students in relevant communications.
